FORM – SLIP & FALL / PREMISE LIABILITY

DEFINED: A slip and fall or premise liability case involves ANY type of incident where someone suffers injury on someone else's property. These type of case range from: falling on a sidewalk; falling in someone's house; suffering injury in a business due to improperly maintained floors; improperly stacked shelves; exposed nails or other sharp objects; injuries at your place of employment where the alleged negligence is not due to other employees or your employer (work place injuries attributable to co-workers are worker compensation matters.); injuries due to the criminal conduct of others while on someone else's property (mugged in a mall or parking lot, sexual abuse while hospitalized, etc.). **If you think you may have a case call me. I will always enjoy speaking with you.**

H. How the accident happened

1. In your own words describe how the accident happened in as much detail as possible. (As time passes we tend to forget things. So you should try to record everything you remember as soon as you can.)



2. PHOTOGRAPHS (VERY VERY IMPORTANT)

a. Regrettably people will try to hide what they do wrong. They will immediately try to fix what is wrong. While this is noble so that others will not get hurt, it also destroys the evidence of how you got hurt.

b. It does not matter how you photograph the scene: Camera, cellphone, tablet, etc.

c. TIPS to capture the scene

a. If your incident involves a crevice, stick something in the crevice like a pen or other standard size object to try to show how deep and / or wide the crevice is.

b. If your incident involves clear fluid on a floor try to put something around the outer edges of the fluid to show the size of the area of the floor where the fluid was.

c. Try taking the picture with and without a flash. Sometimes a flash creates a distracting glare.

d. If you can, take the photograph from different angles and different sides.

I. Conversations: If you spoke to any managers or employees or owners of the property where you were injured, record, as best you can, what each conversation was about. (Who said what?)
